Description:

Archeological matter - statement by the artist:

In the art of memory it is said that chaining systems can be generated so that the memory is preserved as it was at the moment of the experience.

- 1. One day I ate a bread that looked like the small lumps of clay that I was holding in water and wet sand in the workshop.
- 2. The plan was to imprint in the memory of the wet clay the passage of time. I wrapped the remnants of clay I had in the workshop in old cloth. I sunk them in buckets with sand and water and kept them wet for a long time.
- 3. During that time, things happened that I didn't think of: fungi came out.
- 4. As my job was only to look at the buckets, I discovered the reflection of the sky in the water.
- 5. Until one day I took them out and put them to dry to be able to observe what time and humidity had produced.
- 6. I separated the wrapping from the clay.
- 7. I separated all its parts.
- 8. I looked at the bodies that had formed.
- 9. I carefully made a collection of samples.
- 10. I saw what moisture, time and fungus had done to the fabrics.
- 11. How they looked like shrouds.
- 12. And that when I inverted the image it looked like a starry sky.

I discovered that my art of memory had allowed me not only to print time but to see in a small clod of earth, an image of what could be a texture of the universe.
